## <u>Mayor's Message</u>

There is a term that is used by planners, architects, and even natural history interpreters that, in my mind, is

one of those key factors that make Yachats special. The term is "Spirit of Place". I looked it up seeking to find out about its origins and what discipline might claim authorship. I didn't find its origin, but I did find a Wikipedia definition that lays out the concept better than I might hope to do myself. It read:

> Spirit of place (or soul) refers to the unique, distinctive and cherished aspects of a place; often those celebrated by artists and writers, but also those cherished in folk tales, festivals and celebrations. It is thus as much in the invisible weave of culture (stories, art, memories, beliefs, histories, etc.) as it is the tangible physical aspects of a place (monuments, boundaries, rivers, woods, architectural style, rural crafts styles, pathways, views, and so on) or its interpersonal aspects (the presence of relatives, friends and kindred spirits, and the like).

If Wikipedia had gone further and sought to illustrate the concept by example they would most assuredly have posted an aerial photograph of Yachats. We have our share of artists and writers and visitors who illustrate, describe or appreciate the natural beauty of the place. We have our share of stories, and history, and quirks that make us unique. We have our share of festivals that celebrate music, mushrooms, agates, and whatever else strikes our fancy. And we certainly have relationships that form the fabric of our community from relatives to friends, and to kindred spirits whether they are our neighbors or have simply been drawn here by Yachats' charm.

It has been said that there is a vortex in Yachats that spins so powerfully it sucks the right people in and flings the wrong people out. The people that get sucked in are those that have the most acute spirit of place and the greatest affinity for the spirit in <u>this</u> place.

This month that vortex has sucked in another new Yachatian. Our new City Administrator has been feeling the pull of the coast for years and the spin of that vortex has finally gotten a firm enough grip to bring her to us. Joan Davies comes from Hines, Oregon where she has been working in a similar capacity for the City of Hines. We have an exceptionally beautiful garden at the Little Log Church, and from late May through July it hits the glory time. The garden is quite happy largely due to the loving care of our landscapers Jack and Mary Eriksen, who began caring for our grounds about three years ago.

Jack and Mary owned the Oregon Coast Greenhouse just a few miles north of Yachats for many years. In fact, Jack's family started the greenhouses over 50 years ago. When the business closed in 2011 they opted to do independent work in landscape maintenance and then began operating *The Plant Stand* during the spring and summer in Waldport.

Recently I had a nice chat with Mary about the treasures in the LLC&M's garden. She helped me identify some of the gems there. The white and pink Watsonia are especially stunning now, with their very tall spikes reaching to the heavens. Next month, around July 4<sup>th</sup>, we will be seeing the fire-cracker like Lucifer Crocosmia, a monbretia plant, bursting alive on the north side of the grounds. For those of you interested in monsters, take a walk to the southwest corner of the garden, just behind the sea lion sculpture, and find the gunnera. This giant very broad leafed green plant looks a little like rhubarb on steroids, or may have come out of the Little Shop of Horrors. It grows best in a boggy area, and that's just what we have in that corner. When you see it you will understand why it's also called "dinosaur food". The honeysuckle vines planted last year along the walkway to the museum are also thriving, and we've seen an increase in hummingbird activity there.

One of our goals at the LLC&M is to create identification signage for these plants so folks can get acquainted with these beautiful plants, trees and herbs. We'll keep you apprised.

Meanwhile Jack and Mary will be working their magic on grounds. We thank them for their work. Mary says, however, they don't think of it as work; this is "fun time" for them.

Take a walk-through sometime soon. The garden will be glad you did.

# Commons Events

I noticed recently that along with the variety and number of events

taking place inside the Commons building - that there is also a lot going on outside! The Rainspout Festival recently held its Sunday events outside in the Picnic Shelter. The skate park has all its new elements in place, and three beautiful Mosaic Planters now grace the corner of the 501 building (the former bank building).

The Rainspout Festival was held on the last weekend of April - hosting a number of both local and visiting bands playing Bluegrass, African drumming, Old-time and Cajun music. The Festival was sponsored by Polly Plumb Productions - a recently formed local tax exempt organization whose mission is to produce dynamic and innovative arts and culture programming for the benefit of the Yachats community and visitors.

Early on Sunday morning of the last day of the festival, it was apparent that the unfolding day was a most beautiful one weather wise - and a unanimous decision was made to move the entire event outside and sound system from on the MP stage out into the Picnic Shelter. This was no small feat as the decision included moving the sound system, catered food, seating and the musicians and audience all outside! It turned out to be a wonderful move as the temperature was perfect for the two bands that played that afternoon. People listened and danced to the music. And as part of the celebration, a May Pole dance was held on the field north of the shelter. It was agreed that outside in the Picnic Shelter was a perfect venue for this type of performances and activities.



The three new Mosaic Planters and the two benches on the 501 Building corner were created and

installed by the 25 Ford Institute Leadership Program participants from Waldport and Yachats. This is the fourth such leadership program in our area over the past 6 years sponsored by The Ford Family Foundation. While learning about and practicing skills in decision making, communication, community organizing, conflict resolution - the group moved through a process of brainstorming ideas for a community project - and choosing, developing and completing a \$12,000 community project. The class chose mosaic planters that artistically connect the three communities of Yachats, Waldport and Seal Rock. Over the course of the project, some 100 people participated from the initial class sessions through the planning and decorating of the planters with the mosaic tile patterns. A community group effort indeed! The result is groups of 3 decorated planters and two benches in each of the three participating communities.



And after many years of attempts at creating a skate park - we have finally succeeded! All the elements are in place for the new skate

board area behind the 501 building. This venture, sponsored by the Friends of the



Commons, has also been an example of a community group effort. A number of local organizations along with youth and adults have contributed to planning, fundraising and installing the skating elements. Watch this summer for the creation of a final touch on this project - a 200 foot mural behind the skate park that will be compiled from drawings of local children and youth.

## <u> Yachats Trails Update</u>

Due to enthusiastic turnouts recently by so many super-duper extraordinary volunteers, Yachats

trails are looking great! And this coming month... even better... Thank you all for your fantastic work and dedication!

First up on the calendar this month is **National Trails Day** on June 4<sup>th</sup>. Each year on the first Saturday in June we plan community projects to celebrate National Trails day. This year will be different though. While there will be no public celebration event, it is our target date for reopening the Amanda Trail that was washed out and closed last December. The Oregon Parks and Recreation Department (OPRD), Siuslaw National Forest, Urban Forestry crew from the Angell Job Corps, ODOT and Trails Crew members have been working collaboratively on the project and made tremendous progress toward this goal. If all goes according to plan, a group of assigned Trails Crew volunteers will spend the morning of the 4<sup>th</sup> sprucing up the trail in preparation for opening it to hikers beginning at 1:00 p.m. that day.

That is the logistical aspect, but the magical part of the story is how Amanda's presence will be reawakened at a new gathering space along the trail. Many years ago a woman named Beth Cook saw a drawing of a statue of a Native American woman and fell in love with it. She took her vision of how it might be modified to artist Sy Meadow and commissioned him to create a new statue that also included his own aesthetic sense. He made a mold and cast two statues that went to live with Beth and her wife Joan Wilker. Eventually he cast one more statue which he gave to his friend George Copage. George, in turn, named her Amanda and eventually gifted her to the Trail in 2003. This is the statue that we lost to the December storms.

Fast forward 5 months and a new symbol of Amanda's spirit and reawakening has emerged along with the trail. Knowing Amanda's importance to the cultural and spiritual history of this area Beth and Joan have generously donated one of their statues (in effect one of the Amanda statue's ancestors) to honor the trail and be a guardian of the land and its history. As a community we cannot thank them enough for their sensitivity and generosity which is turning loss into new life. Once the trail opens on the 4<sup>th</sup> be sure to visit the Amanda spirit's new home. You'll find it in a cleared area north and slightly upstream of the creek crossing - a beautiful serene space to begin the next chapter of Amanda's story.

**Annual 804 Trail Ivy Pull**. This year, on Saturday, June 18<sup>th</sup>, the Overleaf Lodge & Spa, Yachats Trails Committee, SOLVE and Dahl Disposal Service will host the 8<sup>th</sup> annual occurrence of this event. It has become a VERY popular volunteer opportunity that continues the community's effort to manage invasive ivy on the Trail and restore natural habitat. # <u>All backyard BBQ's,</u> <u>hotdog/ S'Mores</u> <u>fire pits require a</u> <u>FREE permit</u>

The Yachats Fire Department must issue a FREE permit to ALL fire pits at summer homes, vacation rentals and full time residents! Last year's permit will expire on June 1, 2016. This permit allows backyard fire pits for roasting food such as hotdogs and marshmallows; however an inspection is required prior to issuance of the permit so please do not wait until the day of your event to contact us at (541) 547-3266.

Oregon Dept. of Forestry tells us that we could expect this summer to be as dry as last year and may even include a late summer closure for the pit permits. If you have a vacation rental with a

Page 6 of 7 JUNE 2016 pit permit be sure your manager renews yours before June 1, 2016.

As always try to have your yard debris hauled off before it gets to dry and becomes a fire hazard.
